Student Recognition Day!

It was standing room only as 60 friends, family and community members gathered on June 12th to celebrate our students' achievements. One student earned her high school diploma, four are transitioning back to their public high school, and many others were touted for personal strides realized in academic and social growth.

Margo Warden, Director of the First Year Experience at Johnson State College and a former Laraway employee, addressed students and guests in a speech that challenged our kids to aim high and be their very best.



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On Teaching Science...learning to swim on their own

Aaron McGee's science class at Laraway took on an interesting twist this year. Aaron's students, in partnership with the Lamoille River Anglers' Association (L.R.A.A.) and the Lamoille County Natural Resources Conservation District (L.C.N.R.C.D.), raised brook trout that were released into Vermont's Gihon River.

The L.R.A.A. bought an aquarium chiller for the class from which 200 baby trout were successfully hatched. The science unit included learning about the life cycle of trout, the importance of being good stewards of the environment, and lessons about the students themselves.

One student created a graph predicting when the trout would hatch. Incubation periods typically range from 44 to 144 days and are dependent on water temperatures. Warm water speeds up the process; cold water lengthens the incubation period.

Students learned that tiny alevins emerge from the eggs. Each alevin has a yoke sac on its underside which serves as a food source. Alevins hovered near the bottom of the tank until their yoke sac was consumed and only then were ready to swim up to the surface as fry. Brook trout become parr when they literally earn their stripes— dark vertical bars on their sides. This coloration allows them to blend in with their surroundings, thus staving off hungry predators. Students learned that these amazing

transformations all occur in the first year will develop the dazzling red, yellow and maples on our mountainsides.

Kim Komer of the L.C.N.R.C.D. visited the importance of maintaining clean, macro-invertebrates serving as the main rivers and streams is having good buffer Students learned they each can have a coordinator of the Trees For Streams of life. the class as a guest speaker. She pointed out cold, clear, unpolluted rivers to support the dietary source of the trout. A big part of clean zones that filter pollution and decrease erosion. role in protecting these fragile ecosystems. As Program, Kim led our students and staff in

planting trees along the Lamoille River in Cambridge and the Wild Branch in Craftsbury. As a school we planted over 350 trees, bushes, and shrubs that will provide improved habitat for land animals and fish.

It is no small coincidence that several students from Aaron's science class opted to join Laraway's Friday Fishing Club which he facilitates with fellow staffers Walter Wendling and Dave Ward. So far they've cast their lines into the Black, Lamoille, Clyde and Gihon Rivers along with Waterman Brook. They wrapped up the year with an overnight trip to Green River Reservoir followed up by a four-day canoe camping trip to Lake Richardson in Maine's western mountains. Memories lasting a lifetime were created as students caught landlocked salmon, perch and brook trout.

At Laraway, we work to support children and youth by encouraging them to take small steps—academic and social—to swim to the top of the water, look around, assess preparation required, and ultimately, dive into life's opportunities. Brook trout are smaller than other trout species. By incubating, caring for, nurturing and ultimately releasing the trout to the wide open waterway of the Gihon River, students learned transcendent lessons about preparing for adulthood.

Just as trout released to rivers require clean, oxygenated waters to thrive, kids entering our communities need welcoming supports, people who will offer guidance along with just enough freedom for kids to eventually learn to swim on their own.
